- 38. Thomas Enroughty, age 77; left Virginia, came around Cape Horn, and arrived at San Francisco in 1844.
- 39. A. W. Harmon, age 58; left Illinois, crossed the plains, and reached Placerville, California, in 1850.
- 40. A. W. Blair, age 65; left North Carolina, crossed the plains, and arrived at Coloma, California, in 1849.

- 41. A. Starke, age 64; left Germany, came around Cape Horn, and arrived at Yerba Buena, now San Francisco in 1847.

- 43. D. G. Loveall, age 64; left Texas, crossed the plains, and arrived at Sonora, California in the year 1849.

Major D. A. Shaw then submitted the following motion in writing and was read to the Society as follows:

"I move that General John C. Fremont be elected an Honorary Member of this Society of Pioneers and that a committee of five members be appointed to invite him and Mrs. Fremont to visit with us at a time to be designated by the committee, and that a banquet be had at that time in their honor."

Which motion was seconded by John Brown Sr. and John M. Muscott who expressed great pleasure of embracing the opportunity this offered them of seconding a motion in honor of their old friend and acquaintance, Gen. John C. Fremont, which motion on being put to a vote was unanimously and enthusiastically
