DEDICATION OF PIONEER MONUMENT -II -From an address delivered in Tabernacle, Salt Lake City, Utah, Sunday, May 15, 1927, by Dr. Richard R. Lyman.

The call for this group of pioneers to go from Utah into southern California, came in February 1851. In the following month, March, the long journey was begun. One hundred families were in the company, or five hundred people.

These travelers had to remain in Sycamore Grove three months, or from June until September, while Amasa M. Lyman and Charles C. Rich Carried on negotiations with the owners of the large ranches in that neighborhood. At the end of this period a deal was closed for the purchase of what was called the "Rancho del San Bernardino." A payment of \$77,500 was to be made for an area slightly greater than 35,000 acres.

Those forward looking pioneers, when laying out the city of San Bernardino, set aside a public park, which is now known as Pioneer

park, and a cemetery, which is now called Pioneer cemetery.

It was soon discovered that going to Los Angeles to resord deeds and attend to other county business, was extremely inconvenient. With the thought in mind of securing a new county, these pioneers sent Capt. Jefferson Hunt to the Legislature of California, for the purpose of securing necessary legislation to organize a new county to be known as the county of San Bernardino.

Captain Jefferson Hunt was an unusual character; he was one of the most prominent members of the Mormon Battalion. History tells us he was never given all the honor and advancement in position to which his strength and character and place in the Mormon Battalion entitled him. He was a splendid preacher, a man of eloquence, a sturdy pioneer, and a member of the San Bernardino high council.

In accordance with the instructions he received, this worthy pioneer went to Benica, California, where the Legislature met, and on the 26th day of April, 1853, he secured legislation which authorized the creation of San Bernardino county, and four days later, April 30, 1853, a commission of four was appointed, in accordance with the act of the Legislature, to make preparations for electing the officers of the new county. It was on that day that the county of San Bernardino was born. The four commissioners who prepared for the election of officers and the creation of the new county were: Isaac Williams, John ficers and the creation of the new county were: Isaac Williams, John Brown, David Seeley and H.G. Sherwood.
